Breast Cancer Awareness is not just a campaign, it is a movement dedicated to education, early detection, support and ultimately, saving lives. According to the American Cancer Society, the 5-year survival rate for localized breast cancer (cancer that has not spread outside of the breast) is about 99%.

DONNA'S STORY AS A SURVIVOR



A Picture of Strength: Surviving Breast Cancer Twice.


This is a story of resilience through faith and courage. A battle that gives us hope.

When most people hear the words "you have breast cancer" their world stops. For Acadia Parish Educator and Local President, Donna Wilridge, it didn't happen once but twice. On Thursday, March 12, 1987, I woke up excited to celebrate my daughter's eighth birthday. I also had my yearly medical checkup later that day. Unfortunately, my day did not end with the excitement that I had anticipated. The results of my mammogram showed a lump in my left breast that was possible breast cancer. I was stunned and yes, I did cry when I received my diagnosis, but I also prayed. At that moment I decided to stop feeling sorry for myself because I was determined to fight this disease.

As an only child I was blessed with supportive strong-minded parents, friends and pastoral guidance. Because of them we were ready to face this disease with all we had. Five days later I had surgery and was scheduling appointments for my chemotherapy treatments. After practically begging my doctor, he agreed that I could return to work three weeks later. I quickly went back to work because I needed my students as much as my students needed me. After work I would go to my chemotherapy treatments.

Fast forward: I faithfully went to my yearly checkups and did my mammograms. However, in August 2018 (31 years later) I was diagnosed again with right breast cancer. Sadly, to say I did not have my parents with me to go through this again. However, I did have my daughter and my three granddaughters, as well as other family members. Once again, my students and parents were a part of my support system. Four weeks later I returned to my classroom and students.

2025 LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION UPDATE: SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Act 48 - Adds scholarships, grants and federal student financial aid forms to high school financial literacy course

Act 174 - Requires certain college students to complete anti-hazing course

Act 222 - Constitutional Amendment to eliminate three education trust funds to pay off 2billion I debt for Teachers Retirement System of Louisiana providing savings to local school systems

Act 270 – Prohibits inclusion of test scores or data from students with certain attendance records in teacher evaluations

Act 347 - Expands TOPS scholarships creating an excellence level for students scoring 31 or above on the ACT and revises eligibility for TOPS - Tech awards

Act 353 – Requires teachers to be trained in numeracy

Act 356 - Requires schools to use a 10-point grading scale to calculate TOPS eligibility

Act 359 - Lowers ACT score requirements for home study students for TOPS eligibility

Act 366 - Requires school systems to provide a permanent salary increase for teachers (\$2250.00) and support workers (\$1125.00) using interest savings from debt payments to Teachers Retirement System of Louisiana

Act 420 - Removes prohibition of guns on campus at private Vo-Tech schools

Act 447 - Transfers the University of New Orleans to the Louisiana State University System

Act 449 - Requires high school students to have access to available vocational and technical courses

Act 469 - Provides for mental health screenings in school

Act 472 - Reduces standardized testing for students in science and social studies to every other year

Act 497 - Modifies disciplinary procedures for students in grades 6 through 12 who are found with certain substances on school property


Act 504 - Requires schools to provide mental health assessments to certain students
